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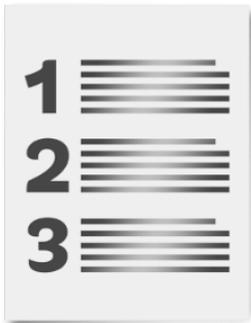


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# About this Easy Read

Council.

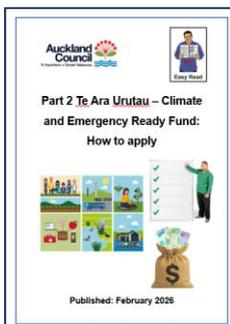


This is Part 2 of 2 Easy Reads about

be **resilient**.



Here **resilient** means being able to:

- plan for what to do:
  - if an **emergency** happens
  - to deal with the effects of **climate change**
- recover from an emergency after it happens.



Part 2 tells you how to apply / ask for  
a **grant** for your community projects.



Here an **emergency** is when something happens that puts people in danger like:

- an earthquake
- a fire
- a flood
- a tsunami
- a volcano if it erupts / bursts
- a very bad storm.



**Climate change** means big changes in the weather all over the world.

It can mean different things will happen in different places like:

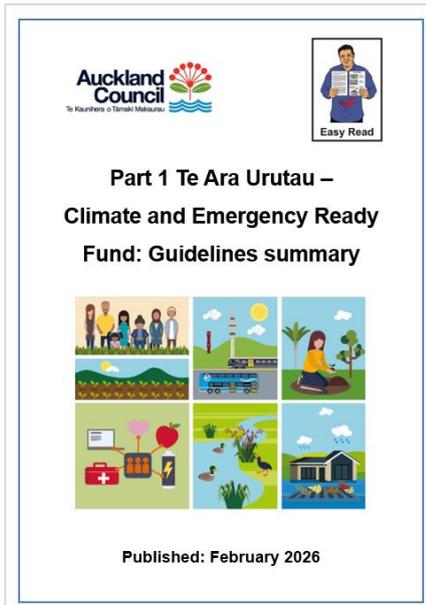
- very bad flooding when storms happen
- very windy weather
- very hot weather
- it being harder to:
  - grow food
  - get clean water.

A **grant** is money to support:

- people to do something
- organisations to do something.



The Auckland Council has grants that people / organisations can ask for to support their communities to be resilient.

Part 1 tells you about:

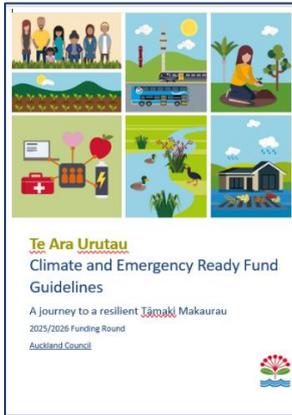

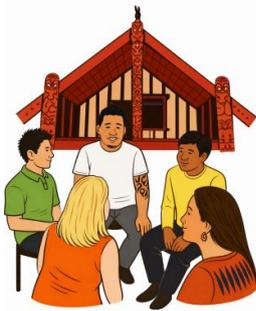

# Who can ask for these grants?



Groups that can ask for these grants are community groups like:

- **not-for-profit** organisations
- **charities**
- **voluntary** organisations
- **mana whenua** organisations
- Māori organisations.

**Not-for-profit** organisations put money they make back into the organisation to make it better.

**Mana whenua** are groups of Māori who have a right to say what happens to their land.



**Charities** are organisations that:

- support people
- have to follow some rules made by the Government
- do not make money for themselves.



**Voluntary** organisations:

- are run by groups who want to support people
- do not make money for themselves.



Here **voluntary** means the organisation:

- is run by people who do not get paid to do the work
- does important work to support people.



Other groups that can ask for these grants are:

- neighbourhood groups
- schools leading community projects
- business groups that are working to make their communities better
- **social enterprises** that do work to make things better for communities.



Here **social enterprises** are businesses that work to:

- make money
- and
- support their community to do things.



# About your project

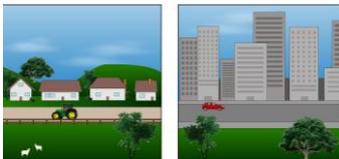
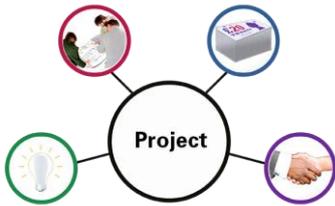


**Applicants** should tell us how their projects will be good for the:

- community
- people
- places that are at a big risk of:
  - climate change
  - emergencies
- places needing to reduce their **greenhouse gas emissions**.



Here an **applicant** is the group asking for a grant.



## Greenhouse gas emissions are:

- gases that make the air hot
- caused by people doing things like:
  - driving cars that use petrol
  - burning things like coal.

Important areas will be different for different:

- projects
- communities.



Important things to have in all projects are:

- working with different groups of people
- projects led by Māori that support:
  - mana whenua
  - mātāwaka / Māori groups.



## Things you cannot use a grant for



There are some things you are not allowed to use grant money for in your project.



You cannot use grant money to pay for:

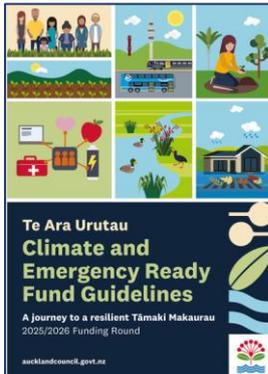
- **legal** expenses like paying a lawyer to do something
- medical expenses like paying to go to your doctor
- projects that mainly support communities not in Auckland.



**Legal** means things to do with the law.



A **law** is a rule made by the Government that everyone must follow.

# How to ask for a grant



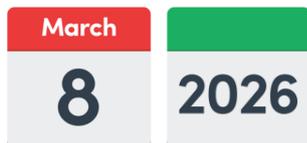
You will need to fill in an application form.

You will find the application form on our website from:



- 2 February 2026

to



- 8 March 2026.

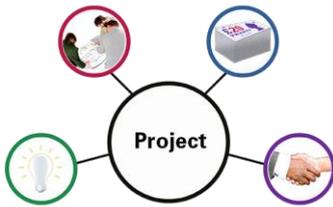
The application form:

- asks for information we need to know to help us make a decision
- will support us to decide who will get a grant to do their project.



The application form asks about your:

- organisation
- community
- project.

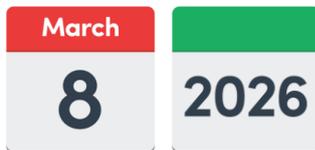


There is support for applicants.

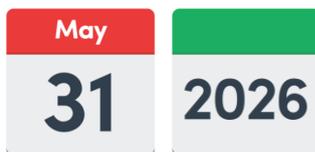

We need to get your application for a grant by 8 March 2026.



We will make decisions about who will get grants by the end of May 2026 at the latest.



Applicants who get a grant will have to sign a **funding agreement**.



A **funding agreement** sets out the rules about how the grant money can be used on your project.



Signing of the funding agreements will start about 1 July 2026.

# Assessment and funding decisions



Here **assessment** is looking at the grant applications to decide if the money should be given to support the projects.



Council staff will:

- assess the grant applications
- make **recommendations** about who should get grants.



Here **recommendations** will say which groups we think should get a grant to do their work.



Things we will think about when making our decisions are if:

- the project is a good match for a project category



- the project will work

- Māori projects are supported by:

- Māori leaders
- working with Māori



- the project will:

- make a difference to the community



- work with people in the community for the community.



Other things we will think about when making our decisions are:



- if **risks** have been:

- found
- **reduced**

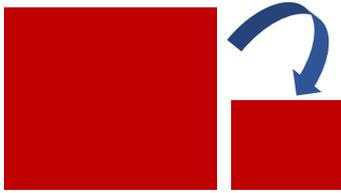


- how the project:

- will make an **impact**
- will reach / work for as many people as possible
- is doing something for the community that is not being done yet.



A **risk** is something that could go wrong.



**Reduce** is to:

- make something smaller
- do something less.



Here an **impact** is the effect the project will have on the community.



We will tell applicants if they have got a grant by:

- phone
- or
- email.



# Reporting



Here **reporting** is telling us about how the project / work supported by our grant went.



Reporting helps us to:

- learn about your project
- share great stories of community action / work on:
  - emergency planning
  - climate change
- understand how well the grant money has been used.





The reporting will be agreed to in the funding agreement.

We will work with you to find a way of reporting that:



- works for you
- tells the story of your work
- tells us the things that went well.



There will be different ways to report to us like by:

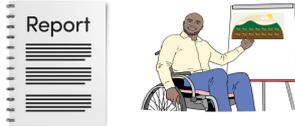


- written reports
- videos
- **case studies**
- presentations
- maps.





Here **case studies** are real life stories about what happened when you were doing the work in the project.



Reporting can also be done in more than 1 way.
